### **An Opportunity to Serve**

Amongst us is a Dharma friend named Judy who joins our faithful samu crew in cleaning our temple on Fridays whenever she's on this side of the island. She works with great joy and enthusiasm, and does whatever is needed at the time, whether it be wiping the floor or dusting or taking out the trash. Once when I thanked her for her help, she responded by saying "It is I who must thank you, Sensei, for this opportunity to serve."

Like the sound of the temple bell, Judy's words reverberated in my heart. "It is I who must thank you, Sensei, for this opportunity to serve.....for this opportunity to serve......for this opportunity to serve....."

How truly wonderful, I thought, to see serving others as an opportunity. In our Zen tradition everything that we do in our daily lives is an opportunity for practice, an opportunity to deepen our understanding of ourselves and others, an opportunity for awakening. We try our best to work mindfully, with great love and care, giving our hundred percent to whatever we do. No task, however small, is without significance. When we are mindful and awake, we are able to see the dynamic working of the Buddha in all our activities and a gratitude springs up in our hearts and brings joy to our daily lives.

We can practice meditation alone, but it's in the setting of the Sangha, the community, that the Dharma comes to life and our practice is put to the test. When we are among others, we are called, over and over again, to let go of our self-centeredness, our ego-driven desires, and our deeply treasured views of how things should be. In a fully functioning Sangha, no one begrudges another for having a better job or more status. No one speaks ill of anyone or treats anyone with disrespect. Each person simply does what is needed, working side by side with others to ensure the happiness and well being of the entire community.

Service to others, however, is not only a matter of doing. Service is also a matter of *being*. I've seen dedicated volunteers push themselves so hard that they become tired, angry, and resentful, and others who become so attached to their positions and status in the community that they suffer greatly when changes occur. It is unfortunate when this happens, because service can be opportunities for joy, fulfillment and awakening.

I know people who unknowingly serve others simply by being a kind and gentle presence in a hurried world. Unattached to status, fame, or power, they simply give of themselves, working hard for the benefit of all. This is the Buddha Way.

I wish you and your family a very happy Obon season. Please join us on July 8<sup>th</sup>.
