Communication Workshop to be Held August 24 – 26

"Inner Disarmament: the Art of Proactive Integral Communication" taught by Rev. Robert Joshin Althouse will take place at Daifukuji Soto Mission from August 24 – 26. First Anniversary of

Daifukuji Yoga

For the past year, we have been gathering on Sunday afternoons at 4:00 pm at Daifukuji for an hour-long yoga class taught by Keith Olson. A diverse group of participants of differing generations and previous yoga experience come together to increase our flexibility and reconnect to our body, mind and spirit.

Many of the participants have found that practicing yoga helps them engage in their lives more fully. "Yoga enables me to have flexible hips and knees so that I can practice hula and taiko," said Nancy Osako. "I appreciate Keith's gentle approach, allowing me to be as flexible as I can be without forcing postures." For others, yoga helps them get through their daily routines a little more easily. With skillful use of yoga blocks, straps, and chairs, Keith helps students get into and hold their postures with comfort.

Students have found an unexpected side affect of practicing yoga. They find themselves aware of their breathing. According to Keith, "We practice breathing through our postures in class so that when we are faced with a challenging situation like a car swerving into our lane, we don't hold our breath. We learn to inhale and exhale through life's adversities."

Despite a busy work schedule as the Manager of the Water Quality Laboratory at NELHA, Keith continues to teach three yoga classes a week. "I have found that yoga is not only relaxing for the body, but also brings peace of mind. Yoga can be practiced throughout your entire lifespan, not just when you are young and in good shape. In fact, flexibility and balance become even more critical to our quality of life as we age," Keith said. He hopes to continue to teach tools that help students expand their capabilities, increase acceptance of their unique bodies and life situations, and to relax.

Since Daifukuji Yoga begain in July 2006, we have donated \$1,035 to the temple.

New students are welcome and the first class is free. Sundays 4-5 pm in the Hisashi Kimura Cultural Hall.

Daifukuji Members: \$15 per month, \$5 per class Non-members: \$25 per month, \$8 per class

100% of fees collected are donated to the temple, so come and give yoga a try!

Sojiji Soin Temple Damaged

An earthquake in March caused major damages to the hondo (main hall) and zazen-do (meditation hall) of the Sojiji Soin, the original Sojiji temple located near Wajima on the Noto Peninsula. The temple, which is over 700 years old, is of major importance both historically and religiously to the Soto sect. Bishop Jiho Machida explained that an abbot from Sojiji came to America in 1921, met with President Harding, and spoke in behalf of all immigrants who were Buddhists. He also visited many Buddhist temples of all sects in Hawaii, which had a major impact on Buddhism in these islands.

Bishop Machida, Hawaii Soto Mission Association President Kenichi Watanabe, and Soto Mission of Hawaii President Tom Itagaki and Mrs. Itagaki visited the Soin Temple in June to view the damages and to present a donation of \$15,000 (\$5,000 from the Hawaii Soto Mission Association and \$10,000 from the Soto Mission of Hawaii) to the Soin Reconstruction Fund.

The 2007 Daifukuji Tour to Japan will include a stop at this historic temple.

Incidentally, another earthquake recently struck Niigata, Japan. We gratefully report that Rev. Ryuji Tamiya and family and their temple Kogenji are all fine.

Summer Greetings from Jiko Sensei

"Dharma gates are boundless; I vow to enter them." (Shigu Seigan Mon)

I am writing this on a misty summer morning. Outside, taiko group members who are here to perform are watching the fog blow in. Inside the hall, Kona Daifukuji Orchid Club members dressed in blue orchid shirts are sharing their exquisite blooms with the many visitors who have come to the annual orchid show. Started by the late Tom Kadooka, the orchid club is celebrating its 25th year of flowers and friendship. Tom is here in spirit. And so is Evelyn Kadooka, who has recently moved to Honolulu to be with her children and grandchildren. They are both greatly missed, yet their knowledge and love of orchids are being passed on to the next generation of orchidists.

Today's theme is "orchids." Last week it was "Obon." The week before it was "Temple Clean Up." Summer is a busy, happy time at the temple, a season of great energy and activity. Our members have been coming out and working hard for the benefit of the whole community. The merit is extended in all directions in ever widening circles. One feels it.

August will be quieter. At the beginning of the month a group of doctors from Hiroshima will be using our social hall for eight days to give health examinations to the descendents of those who came to Hawaii from Hiroshima, the city upon which the atom bomb was dropped.

On August 12th Sunday morning family services will begin afresh. Teiho and Rabjee Sensei will be helping with the kids and teen Dharma programs, and Aunty Taura is preparing to teach new Dharma songs. Our family services are held with the children in mind, but are not just for children. The services are open to members and friends of all ages. Won't you join us on Sunday mornings at 9:30 for fellowship and Dharma enrichment?

Then, on August 20th at 4 pm, the Sangha will gather for Jill Teiho's tokudo ceremony which will be officiated by Teiho's teacher, the Reverend Robert Joshin Althouse. Michiko Enomoto is sewing new robes for Teiho for her ceremony. And I will be passing on to Teiho a black okesa (the cloth that is worn over the Buddha robe) and zagu (bowing cloth) which Tamiya Sensei used during his training and handed down to me to use during my training. From hand to hand and heart to heart our Dharma line continues strongly. Please come out to congratulate & encourage Teiho who's been of such wonderful service to our Sangha. "Teiho" means "faithful to the Dharma" and is a Buddhist name that describes her perfectly.

In the fall, the Daifukuji Caring Circle's program for seniors that we've been talking about for a long time will become a reality. Daifukuji member Vivian Ontai (who is also a Board & Fujinkai member, taiko student, and lomi lomi practitioner) has agreed to serve as project coordinator and is excited about getting started. We will soon be asking for volunteers and funds to start a program for seniors called Project Dana. Taking care of our kupuna and doing what we can to meet their spiritual and social needs is important to us.

Also in the fall, a brochure describing the Soto Zen Buddhist Lay Confirmation Ceremony will be mailed out to all member families. My dream of giving members the opportunity to receive the precepts and a Buddhist name is slowly coming into being. I have been putting together the materials needed, and the beautiful purple *wagesa* (the sacred collar worn as a symbol of one's commitment to the Buddha's teachings) embroidered with the Soto crests which I ordered from Japan have arrived.

Together, dear friends, we will deepen our Buddhist practice and walk hand in hand along this most precious and wondrous path.
