Message from Your Outgoing Temple President

Dear Members and Friends.

I hope this finds you in good health and looking forward to a great New Year. It is going to be a challenging year, that's for sure. One way that we may get thru it with the least amount of stress is, when waking up each morning, to think of three things that we are most grateful for. This way, we start our day feeling blessed.

I would like to let you know what your Board of Directors has accomplished this year. With everyone's help, many good things have been accomplished. One of the things that we are very happy about is that Jill Teiho Wagner has been admitted to the Hawaii Soto Shu Ministers Training Program. In addition to training with Rev. Jiko, Teiho has served on the Board as our recording secretary and has also been working as Rev. Jiko's office assistant.



We had another successful Bazaar this year. Our volunteers spent many hours making it happen. Thank you to everyone for your hard work.

New doors have been put on our crematorium building. They have been painted red to match the rest of the temple buildings. The ovens inside are being dismantled and the bricks on the inside of the ovens have been taken away. Eventually the metal casing will also be removed. In the not-too-distant future we will be able to renovate the building, our intention being to use it for longer meditation sessions.

All the buildings on the temple grounds were tented and treated for termites by the Terminex company.

We have a completely new Jizo-do. The entire building has been replaced with new material and reconstructed in the original design.

We have two projects that are in progress. We will be changing from a cesspool system to a septic tank. We have the engineer plans and have requests out for a bid to do the work. The Board has allocated funds to change the men's outside bathroom to the old unused building on the makai side of the women's bathroom. That building will get a new roof and the inside will be changed and There will be a fitted with new fixtures. partition between the two buildings to ensure privacy. One of our members, Steve Mann, will be starting that project this month and will be finished by the new year. We are very fortunate to have Steve, who has, throughout the year, donated many hours of his time as our temple handyman.

Our temple always looks beautiful. Thank you to the members of the samu crew who clean our temple and take care of our grounds weekly. I also wish to thank the volunteers of Project Dana who make this program a special one for our temple kupuna. A new two-year term is starting for our Board of Directors. According to our By-Laws, a president may not serve for more than 2 consecutive two-year terms. I have served for four years, and will now serve as an advisor for the next two years. This is a nonvoting position, one which will lend continuity to the Board.

Your Board of Directors is a working Board. We all have specific responsibilities, as well as the issues that we work on together. I would like to encourage you to think about being a Board member at some time in the future. It is a very rewarding experience. I have been fortunate in having a Board that has supported me and willingly worked with They have all been special. me. One person who has consistently gone beyond the call is Joyce St. Arnault. She has kept a sharp eye on our finances and I am very grateful for that. I feel honored that the Board and all of you have had the confidence in me to believe that my greatest concern has been the welfare of the temple and all its members. Thank you for the opportunity to serve. I'd also like to thank our outgoing Board members Alfreida Fujita, Velvet Replogle, Vivian Ontai, and Christo Izumi. Please give your wholehearted support to the incoming Board.
